- b) New AIP/ASA Congressional Science and Engineering Fellow: Makensie Lystrup
- c) AAAS Human Rights Survey meeting: W at 5:30 pm, Cedar Room. Open
- d) Report on Green International Code Council (Noral Stewart)
  - The comments submitted were endorsed by NCAC, ASTM, INCE, and an ASHRAE Technical Committee. David Marsh, Ken Roy, and Amy Costello were present last week at the code hearing. There are potential problems in classroom acoustics, because of the language in the Standard. Some additional comments which were submitted still need approval. The group was asked to try to include language on indoor/outdoor noise reduction in noisy environments. There will be a final vote in November in Phoenix, Arizona.
- e) Michiko So/Larry Finegold
  - There was a motion by Steve Pettyjohn, seconded by Rich McKinley to send contact Larry Finegold and express our sympathies at his loss. It was suggested that it go on ASA letterhead. The vote was unanimous (in favor).

#### 5. Publications and Standards

a) JASA Associate Editors (AEs) for Noise (B. S. Cazzolato, Ken Cunefare, K. V. Horoshenkov, Vladimi Ostashev, Brigitte Schulte-Fortkamp)

<u>Change</u>: Ken Cunefare is going off as AE; Sanford Fidell is going on as AE. Ken was recognized for his service.

- b) JASA Express Letters (EL) Associate Editor for Noise (Mike Stinson)
  - JASA EL is growing rapidly, but Noise doesn't use making use of it as much as some other Technical Committees.
- c) POMA (Kent Gee) -- Kent is now chair of POMA!
  - Alexandra Loubeau is the new AE for Noise.

- Kent requested feedback on the following items:
  - o Is POMA worthwhile?
  - o What about the flexible format?
  - o Is "reviewed" status important?
  - Is an editor-reviewed process sufficiently rigorous?
  - What suggestions do you have to improve POMA?
- These were the responses:
  - o This is not a full peer-reviewed process.
  - o Rich McKinley: It is worthwhile. It is great to be flexible. We need to advertise it more. Two years after a meeting, you have a booklet of submissions.
  - Hales Swift: Will submissions link to abstract? [Not currently.] That would make it more attractive. There is effort to expand into search engines.
  - o Noral Stewart: I like the flexibility. EL is the next step. It can be published again as a peer-reviewed paper.
  - Those with academic interest can secure their contribution, and have a time window in which to publish.
  - Roger Schwenke: It should not be reviewed more stringently than when you propose to give a paper, or it is not a proceedings.
  - POMA is online only, because it is free. There is a volume of POMA published, just like JASA. It is found under ASA publications.
- The status was explained:
  - o POMA is a place to permanently archive a paper version of conference talks
  - There are 11 volumes (including ASA-affiliated conferences)
  - o The submission window is two years from the date of the conference.
  - There is a high acceptance rate.
- "Would you be more or less likely to publish in POMA if it were peer-reviewed?" VOTE
  - Clarification: full peer review, as opposed to the current system.
  - More likely: 0
  - Less-likely: Everybody else.
  - Same: 4
- d) Standards (Paul Schomer)
  - The Standards Committee is moving ahead in international standards with the formation of a new underwater acoustics subcommittee (Subcommittee 3), giving a venue for other committees to participate, such as structural, engineering, underwater, animal bioacoustics, and acoustical oceanography.
